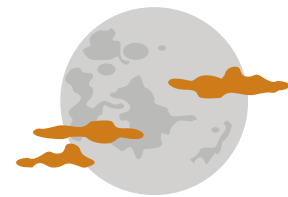

## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

In September's newsletter, I included a lengthy list of businesses that have come to our city in the last 3 ½ years. It is a good size list with such a wide range of businesses. I wanted to follow that list up with some explanation as to what the city's role is when it comes to bringing businesses into our borders. The city does not own the property, we do not build businesses, and generally speaking, we do not restrict what types of businesses can come into the city. There are zoning restrictions as to where and what types of businesses can be brought to the city. Developers and landowners are the key to getting businesses to come to the city. They want to sell property, build businesses, and make a profit. I get a lot of questions such as, "Why doesn't the city bring in an 'insert name here' restaurant? Well, the answer is that the city doesn't do that, the landowners and developers do that. What we as a city are doing is making the proper zoning changes, working with UDOT for access, and working with the developers and landowners to help ensure that things are ready for them when a business comes to them and wants to build. We also have partnerships with EDCutah, Weber County, and our neighboring cities to let the business community know what our "inventory" of available land for development comprises.

Over the past several months, I have been trying to determine what "new" sit-down-style restaurants have come to the Weber County Area. I could only think of a couple of new buildings. I could think of a half dozen or so shifts from one building or city to another. I wish that your favorite restaurant was building new buildings and expanding, especially as our population continues to grow. However, the exact opposite is happening all across the country. Many chain restaurants and locally grown mom-and-pop restaurants and stores are struggling as online buying continues to grow. If you really want to help, next time you don't feel like cooking, don't order it to go or door-dash it. Treat yourself and your family to a nice sit-down meal at a restaurant. We need to consider our ever-shifting habits and their long-term effect on businesses that we so desperately need to keep our residential taxes low.

I am committed to doing whatever it takes to ensure that Pleasant View remains the best place to not only grow up, but the best place to grow old.

## REMINDER FROM THE PLEASANT VIEW POLICE

### DEPARTMENT

This is a reminder for those using the popular e-bikes and e-scooters. The Pleasant View Police Department has noticed an increase in their use. These are fun and quick transportation for kids and adults. We have noticed that bike and scooter riders sometimes keep up with moving traffic, carelessly go through stop signs, and ride on both sides of roadways and sidewalks. Pleasant View City and the Police Department want to caution riders to be safe while riding the e-bikes and scooters to help prevent serious accidents. A bike helmet or other protective gear would help if an accident should occur. Please use caution by stopping at stop signs, yielding to pedestrians, not cutting in or out of traffic, and avoiding excessive speed. Injuries could be serious if an accident of any kind occurred. Keep your equipment safe and locked up when not in use because e-bikes and scooters are a high theft item.

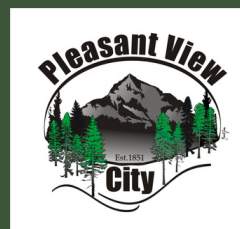

Homes and businesses built prior to 1991 may include harmful materials, including lead, in the water main. The EPA has mandated an audit of all (1990 and older) City-connected water mains to check for potential lead exposure. Lines that are not self-reported will require an on-site inspection by Pleasant View City.
